Human Diversity and the African- American Experience	<p>Students must take two courses in this field for a minimum of six credits. One course must be an African-American Experience course. The second course may be either a second African-American Experience course or a Human Diversity course.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Human Diversity This course includes contemporary subject matter that focuses upon one or more of the following: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> the experience and contributions of African-Americans; the experiences and contributions of other racial/ethnic minority groups within the United States with primary focus on Native Americans, Hispanics, and Asians. the experiences and contributions of other groups in the United States that encounter bias based upon group identity (includes gender, sexual orientation, disability, age, and/or religion). African-American Experience <p>The central and primary focus of the course shall pertain to the African-American experience. Specifically, it should require students to explore one or both of the following issues; African-American history and culture or the African-American urban experience. In addition to appropriate content areas listed above, a major component of all courses in this area must be on race and racism- the interaction between blacks and whites in the United States.</p> <p><i>Comments: Three hours of the African-American Experience and Human Diversity requirement may also be used to satisfy the Arts/Humanities or Social Science requirement if so listed.
