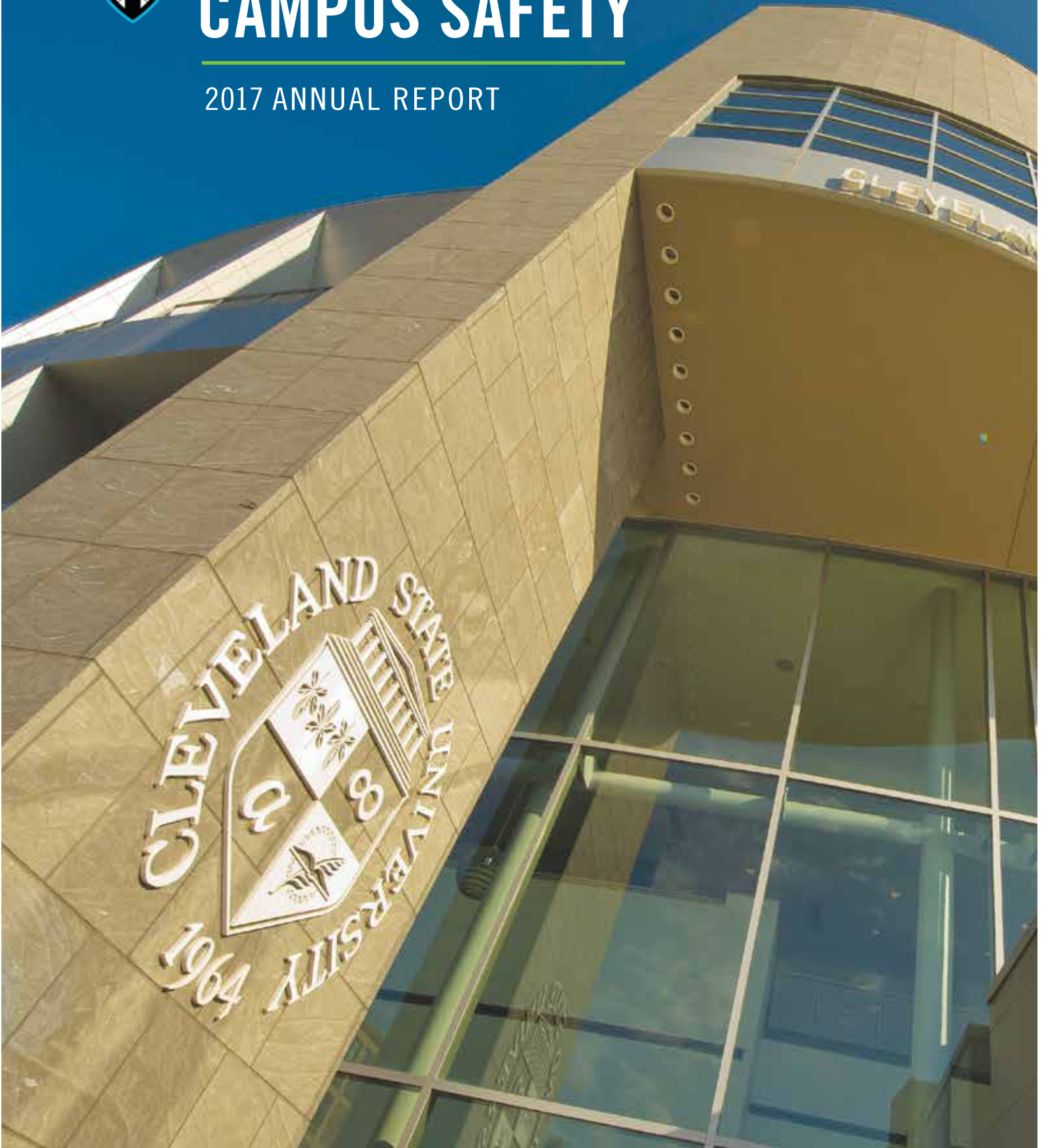

MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF

As we pause and reflect on 2017 there were a number of great success stories experienced across the Cleveland State University campus focused around public safety. The consistent theme for 2017 – in partnership. Some examples include the Ohio Department of Homeland Security continued their efforts in strengthening our relationship by conducting a Security Risk Assessment and providing the Sky Watch Tower for increased security across campus throughout the year.

We continue to focus on student success with our CSU Police Auxiliary Program. Students actively participate in safety strategies across campus while earning college credits. Another program that we engage our students in is the FBI Student Academy at Cleveland State University. It is the second of its kind in the country and provides our students with an intense 15-week program geared towards providing more insight into the agency and law enforcement profession.

The Ohio Department of Public Safety and the Ohio State Highway Patrol were partners in creating Cleveland State University's Motorcycle Unit, includes two officers providing increased presence and visibility while increasing response time to incidents on campus.

At the local level our partnership with the Cleveland Division of Police (CPD) extends far and wide from the Horse Mounted Unit, to safety events across the city. Additionally, we partnered with CPD, Cleveland Metropolitan School District and the Cleveland Browns in an initiative here at CSU focused towards students meeting with law enforcement officers to openly discuss the state of the nation, perception, and overall safety.

In 2017 CSU Police reported an 82 percent increase in Viking Safety Escorts to students, faculty and staff. As a result, this public/private partnership with Bernie Moreno and Volkswagen of Streetsboro provided the organization with a leased vehicle to assist in safety escort efforts.

The Access Control and Security Systems (AC&SS) spearheaded a campus wide Keyscan Aurora implementation process to improve card access to facilities. Additionally, AC&SS conducted Town Halls across campus that offered more insight into process improvements and Single Access Control Coordination. Also part of our campus safety efforts included, the Environmental Health and Safety Office created a comprehensive methodology of tracking Chemical of Interest (COI) in a partnership with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security.

As trends occur across the nation, law enforcement agencies, too, must be nimble when safety is the main priority. Subsequently, CSU Police created a Special Response Team (SRT) that will focus on active aggressor incidents that may take place on or near our campus.

Finally, I would be remiss if I did not mention the continued success of our Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate (A.L.I.C.E.), Rape, Aggression, and Defense (R.A.D.) programs are critical components to our crime prevention efforts for the upcoming year.

OFFICE OF EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT



CSUPD's Office of Emergency Management is dedicated to fabricating and preserving a safe and engaged campus community through mitigation, preparedness, planning, training and educational outreach efforts. By applying an all-hazardous approach, CSU Emergency Management can effectively respond, coordinate and quickly recover from emergencies.

K-9 UNIT



CSUPD's K-9 Unit is composed of one law enforcement officer (PO Edward Stoltz) partnered with a highly trained canine (K-9 Rex). The K-9 Unit performs some of the same duties and tasks as standard police officers. They patrol the community to prevent and respond to crimes, perform investigations, locate and arrest perpetrators and detect dangerous explosives. K-9 Officer Stoltz maintains 24-hour control over K-9 Rex.

ACCESS CONTROL & FIRE SAFETY & SECURITY SYSTEMS



DEPARTMENT-WIDE ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The 2020 Initiative in Spring 2016 facilitated received approval for the \$375,000 project to remove an unsupported access control system (Continuum) and upgrade the legacy access control system, Key-scan System 7, with Key-scan Aurora (fully funded after a four year push).

The same 2020 Initiative gave a green light to allow AC&SS to:

- ▶ Develop a paperless on-line Access Request Form (ARF);
- ▶ Impose a fine for nuisance fire alarms and undocumented events requiring programming for after-hours access;
- ▶ Charge for man-hours spent generating access reports requested by others and for lock-out assistance on campus.

The entire campus underwent an upgrade to the electronic access control systems. The \$375,000 project to remove an unsupported access control system, Continuum, and upgrade the legacy access control system, Keyscan System 7, with Keyscan Aurora was completed in October. Although the upgrade is not seen by the campus population, the system users recognize a marked advantage when programming a cardholder or door schedule.

On December 7, 2017, Access Control was presented a plaque from BEST, the nation's leading supplier of cores and keys. The plaque was presented to "THANK YOU FOR YOUR PARTNERSHIP (as the) 2017 KEYSTONE WEB BETA SITE."

Access Control had been using the legacy desktop version of Keystone since 1992. When BEST offered the partnership to Access Control in developing a new web-based program with better reporting capabilities and a straightforward user platform, the response was YES. After 10 months of software modifications to correct deficiencies discovered by Access Control, BEST now has a product that they are confident to roll out to other users such as The Ohio State University.
