

Graduate Financial Aid Resources

Graduate students are eligible for \$20,500 each FAFSA/Academic year (Starts in Fall and ends in Summer)—or 10,250 per semester in a non-credit based unsubsidized loan. If the 10,250.00 is not enough to cover your educational/ living expenses or last you until the end of summer semester, then you may apply for a credit-based Graduate PLUS Loan.
