The Bachelor of Arts in Nonprofit Administration degree is designed to:

- Develop leadership skills necessary to create positive social change;
- Prepare students to lead, engage and manage volunteers and professionals in a variety of nonprofit organizations;
- Promote strategies for the analysis of complex issues which face nonprofit organizations.
- Provide access to faculty members with expertise in public administration and non-profit management in an urban setting;
- Prepare students for future career challenges, including graduate work in a number of fields.

Assessment and Accreditation of Prior Learning Experience (AAPLE): Credit for Life Experience

The Maxine Goodman Levin College of Urban Affairs conducts an Assessment and Accreditation of Prior Learning Experience (AAPLE) Program which recognizes that learning takes place in settings other than the classroom and is designed to award academic credit for substantial previous learning experiences.

The AAPLE Program:

- Helps integrate life and work experience with other learning goals and educational programs
- Saves students time and money, by not forcing them to re-learn skills already acquired through life experience
- Awards between 4 and 24 credit hours, depending on the amount of experience and its relevance to a degree in Urban Affairs

In preparation for receiving this credit, students enroll in a two-credit hour course: UST 190 (Analysis of Experiential Learning in Urban Studies) This course is offered both fall and spring semesters and provides the understanding necessary to identify relevant prior learning and present evidence of competence in those areas. UST 190 will also

familiarize students with the various majors in the college and assists in planning a Bachelor's degree program.

Admission Requirements

The academic advisor will help students determine what Gen Ed categories remain unfulfilled. Generally, Partnership students should take the following courses at LCCC:

CSU and the Levin College require 128 semester hours for graduation, 36 hours of which must be in upper division (300-400) level courses. All students who graduated from high school in 1987 or later must have completed two years of one foreign language in high school. Students who did not do so must complete a first-year foreign language sequence, or take two semesters of American Sign Language and one approved foreign culture course.

In order to fulfill CSU's residency requirements for the B.A., University Partnership students must complete a minimum of 30 semester hours in CSU course offerings.
